Philanthropy's Opportunities to Break through Silos

'Responsive Philanthropy' features criminal justice reform, collaboration among diverse groups and grant reporting

. This edition of the quarterly journal underlines the need to break through silos of all kinds to be effective at addressing complex social issues.

In the cover story, Ann Beeson of the Open Society Institute writes about the severe shortage of philanthropic support for criminal justice reform. She notes, however, that more and more foundations are recognizing the inextricable connection between our country's mass incarceration epidemic and poverty, homelessness, drug use and other social problems.

Lisa Rangelhelli of NCRP examines the profound effect of the 1992 L.A. riots on the local nonprofit community. Nearly two decades later, she notes how some of the area's most effective organizations are working collaboratively across racial, ethnic, class, religious, cultural and gender identities to address the needs and concerns of their communities.

In "Soothing the Pain Points of Grant Reporting," Michelle Greanias of the Grants Managers Network looks at what a streamlined grant reporting could look like in the real world. She answers the questions: How can foundations streamline the process without sacrificing due diligence? What can grantees and grantseekers do to help foundations navigate the path towards more efficient financial and reporting requirements?

The spring issue of *Responsive Philanthropy* features the work of the Edward W. Hazen Foundation, one of the leading supporters of community activism for education reform and youth involvement.
